boards with snacks will be out to curb your appetite. After lunch desert trays will be served. Both of these are compliments of FBCC,



Veterans day award certificates were handed out during the meeting.

This weekend there will be an open studios event in downtown Greenville. A flyer was handed out to all those interested in attending.

Jud will be hosting a spring croque event, so watch for emails about the event.

Carl Baker would like to hold a Speed-Time-Distance rally sometime in the spring 2025 for the club. He has been a rally master for several other clubs. A show of hands indicated an interest in taking part in a rally. Carl will start putting together the details and get the ball rolling. Watch for emails.

Chuck Gee qualified at Road Atlanta in his class. Congratulations to Chuck.

Tom Buto indicated that we need to nominate and vote on 2026 officers of the club. The proposed officers are: Paul Zimmerman (President), Andrew Steidinger (past President), Chuck Gee (VP), Nigel Brooks (Secretary), Pete Jakubek (Treasurer), Tonya Looper (Director), Paul Novak (Director), Ryan Owens (new Director), Marc Morgan (new Director). Eddie Saunders (Advisor), John Sharpe (Advisor). The slate of candidates was presented to the membership present, nominations from the floor invited, there being none, and the slate of candidates were elected by acclimation of the membership.

Program: Ryan Owens presented a very well documented slide/video history and documentary of his grandfather Cotton Owens, who was one of the veteran NASCAR drivers in the 1940's up to 1960's. His grandfather actually predated NASCAR, and was a Hall of Famer in the modified class of car racing. A few of the presentation highlights are as follow:

- Ryan got into British cars when he bought a 1969 Arckley SS from a club member. Ryan is considered the black sheep of the family for his love of European cars.
- Ryan had three Alpha Romeos, that his grandfather called "Afra's.
- His granddad was a Navy Veteran from WW II, who would come back from the war and get a job at a local junk yard in Spartanburg.
- His boss at the junk yard. Dover Sposeby, was a race driver. He introduced Cotton to car racing, which he said was easy!!! This was the start of Cotton's racing in 1946.
- Cotton Owens built a garage /junk yard/house on the Ashville highway in Spartanburg, which turned into Ryans' playground when he was a kid.
- Cotton would race modifies Dodge/Chrysler/ Plymouth cars that he would build from junk cars. Modifieds were souped up hot rods, about 350 HP, and this was where the money was made. Cotton would go to races for the purses offered.
- At that time, late 40's an early 50's, Spartanburg was the hub of NASCAR racing.
- My granddad was not a talker or teacher, but a doer. My grandmother kept all the news clippings and awards, etc., from which I was able to construct a history of my granddad.
- Cotton raced at the Spartanburg fairground track,

making the 70A car famous.

Ryan's dad was the mechanic for my granddad. Ryan was very close to Cotton; in fact, he was my second dad.

There was a race promoter named Joe Littlejohn, who saw my granddad hanging out at the racetrack in Spartanburg, and called him that little cotton hair kid, because of hi blond hair. The nickname stuck with him for the rest of his life.

Cotton had 54 wins in a season, several times, and won 23 in a row in one season. Racers would come form all over to try and beat Cotton on the tracks.

At this point NASCAR wanted to expand and build a world class race track, initially looking at Spartanburg as the premier NASCAR location. But the county caounsil voted down the proposal as they were worried about booze, traffic and congestion in Spartanburg. So the lost out to Talladega and Charlotte, and the rest is history.

Cottons career came to an end when he had to make a quick decision in 1959 to either hit a wrecked race car or plow into a group of spectators. He chose the wrecked car and ended up in the hospital for 15 days, ending up with double vision. However, he drove for another 13 years with double vision.

Cotton did not run moonshine as most drivers did before NASCAR in those days. In fact, he did not drink, and refused to take advertising dollars from liquor or tobacco companies.

For the 1959 Daytona race, Cotton built a 1957 Pontiac "Thunder Chick" race car and qualified for the poll position. This race was the first NASCAR win for Pontiac.

My granddad was very safety conscious, added extra door bars above what NASCAR required at the time, and adding fuel spillage valve to prevent fires.

In 1964, Cotton started using the Chrysler Hemi engine, which could develop up to 650 HP. This change racing forever, as the Hemi was unbeatable. NASCAR eventually banned the Hemi in 1965, so Cotton and others turned to 1/4 mile drag racing. Cottom put a Hemi in the rear of a station wagon and called in the "Cotton Picker".

My granddad had an outstanding career as a race driver with only an 8th grade education. He was very loyal to the Dodge /Chrysler/

Pontiac brand to the very end.

At this point we ran out of time but look forward to invite Ryan back to present Cotton's later race activities.

What We've Been Working On

Then THIS happened approaching Black Mnt

After 2 hours of ups and downs and lefts and rights and 15 miles from Black Mountain, my brake pedal goes halfway to the floor before engaging stop mode. YIKES! Fortunately, my braking system in the TR7 has a somewhat independent rear and front system. Thankfully, this affected only the front brakes. When allowed to cool for just 5 minutes, the fluid cooled enough to provide a solid pedal.

I'm just beginning to do the diagnostics to get at the bottom of this. However, jacking the front end up reveals that the right front wheel spins with no touching or dragging of the pads. But ooops, the wheel wobbles significantly on the front bearings. Not good.



My guess is that the right-left-right motions of the right wheel in the mountains (due to the loose wheel bearing) caused it to constantly be in contact with one side pad and then the other, etc. There is also the potential that the bearing itself was generating enough heat to eventually boil the fluid boiled and became useless. Thankfully the brake pedal went almost to the floor, but not all the way to the floor.

The drive back home via the highway was a smart choice and new wheel bearings are now on order. A bit of a close call, I'd say. Oh, yup. I should have flushed that brake fluid a few years ago. Advice is don't wait THAT long...



What We've Been Working On

Work on the three wheeler is back on track. We needed a new cross brace that the transmission bolts to. It slips over the two long tubes and the transmission is attached



to it via two studs on the bottom of through holes in the cross brace. If everything doesn't line up exactly right the leaf springs don't sit correctly in relation to the back swing arms. Chris Gilman and I took exact measurements where the holes for the long tubes needed to be and then John Burton on his milling machine worked his magic to get is just right. So that part is done.

These vehicles originally only came with a rear handbrake. Hydraulic brakes were fitted to the front wheels over time for safety. Mine came with what we think are Morris brakes either from a Morris Minor or a Morris 8. But they were worn. After much



reading we decided to go the route of my three wheeler friend Peter Ballard and fit rear brakes from a Triumph Spitfire. Chuck Gee found backing plates and drums, Peter had some new shoes he didn't need and I purchased the other parts new. Chris

Gilman did some nifty machining to create a spacer for the axle so the back plates did not sit against the sliding pillar suspension, we used Eddie Saunders' milling machine to trim the brake drums a bit and then I assembled both brakes on the vehicle. Another box



ticked and after a few mistakes I know how to put drum brakes together. Who knew the springs went on the inside against the backing plate!

I've been working on the new dashboard for a few months now. The old one was junk and made from cheap 1/4" plywood. Not original for sure! I used it as a template and cut a new one from a piece of



Ambrosia Maple I've had for a while. A few touches from the router softened the edges, several coats of high glass spar varnish and I was ready for layout.

The original dashes had a metal plate that fit over a

hole in the dashboard and that's where most of the instruments went. Much like my Plus 4. I purchased a new plate via the Three Wheeler Club in the UK. Some of the old instruments were good but I did buy some new switches. Also a key



system to turn on the ignition for the starter button. Thank you John Burton and Eddie Saunders for helping me puzzle that one out.

After I don't remember how many trial layouts for the

instruments and switches. I was ready to start drilling the holes in the blank metal plate. It was not pre drilled and I had one shot at it. I



first cut a piece of luan the same size and shape as the metal plate. Drilled all my holes, made sure instruments fit and I was happy. The luan then became my template when I drilled the holes in the actual metal plate. And it all fit nicely. After the holes were drilled I sprayed the plate with wrinkle paint as it should be and then assembled the dash. All Morgan three wheelers came with a St. Christoper's medal with the chassis number on it attached to the dashboard. I was able to procure a replica from the Morgan Three Wheeler Club and now my vehicle has one again.




